DO YOU HAVE ANY ADVICE TO STUDENTS?

Be kind to yourself. I think many people in academia hold ourselves to extremely high standards. We look at someone else's CV and think, "Oh I could never do that." We are all working very hard to do things that benefit society and benefit us. We're doing something important. We have a lot of values and a lot of worth and we care a lot about what we do. ... Recognize that whoever you are, you belong here. Science doesn't belong to this person or that person or that titan in your field. This is a social institution. It belongs to all of us in society and everyone has an equal right to be here.

HOW HAS DEI PLAYED A ROLE IN YOUR CAREER?

The first training I really had in creating inclusive and equitable environments came when I was part of the New York city Teaching Fellows before going to graduate school. I taught public high school for a year in New York City. I had not been trained as a teacher. I had a biology degree, but they had us go through a crash course in teaching that emphasized working in diverse classrooms and creating good equitable learning environments. As a graduate student, I volunteered tutoring high school students in Baltimore City. I got to think a lot more about the perspectives of individual students and how their lives were intersecting with their educational experience. I just got to really bond with and know different students' experiences and how they differ from my own.

I wasn't ready to commit to a career in science, so, in a very scientist way, I decided to try a very different career, so I actually went into real estate for two years. I sold real estate in the New York City area, but I realized I missed science, teaching, and learning.

As a postdoc at UCSD, I became an Institutional Research and Academic Career Development Award (IRACDA) fellow. One of the main goals of the IRACDA program is to help diversify the scientific workforce and the scientific community. Part of that was having workshops on proven practices that lead to a more equitable mentoring environment. That training shaped how I teach and mentor students now.

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WHAT DOES AN INCLUSIVE ENVIRONMENT LOOK LIKE?

I would say it's an environment that as much as possible tries to give people what they need to succeed and feel comfortable in that environment. That may be different for different people. Sometimes that removing barriers means or changing practices in a way that creates opportunities and new ways that weren't there before. The goal is evervone their to aive best opportunity to feel important and valued and have opportunities for success in that environment. You can have diversity along many axes. What we really want is diversity of perspectives. The more people who bring a different sense of identity or lived experience to an environment, the stronger it will be. There's a lot of scholarship around how the more diverse the team, the better that team will be at solving problems.

WHAT MAKES A GOOD DEI TRAINING?

The most effective trainings I've been to are in person and they require you to interact with people and be vulnerable and accept other people in their vulnerability. They can be very difficult workshops to run and require professional a to run them successfully. They involve some amount of actual research on issues like implicit bias. These are not matters of opinion, they're matters of scientific scholarship. The existence of implicit bias is not something that

one can opine on. It exists. There's a whole field and body of research around it, and I think being familiar with that research is a really important thing.

That's not to say that we can become experts. For example, I'm an expert in epigenomics. L wouldn't expect somebody else who wants to be informed about epigenomics and reads a few papers to be an expert, but at least they're kind of informed and are seeing the types of data and studies that these things are based on. For us as academics, it's not our job to become experts in implicit bias, etc. We shouldn't say, "oh, I read two papers. I'm now an expert." But we also should be informed and understand some of the data behind it.

Boiling this down to a couple things. One is, I think it really has to embrace learning about these interconnected concepts. One of which, and maybe the most important, is implicit bias. It doesn't matter if you think you are prejudiced or not, we all have implicit biases. Even when we don't want to have them, we do. The only way we can mitigate their effects is to recognize that they're there, and we need to destigmatize having implicit biases.

Other important concepts are stereotype threat and imposter fears and strategies to mitigate them. There's a lot literature and scholarship around those. Again, we can't make them not exist, but there are ways that you can approach a workplace or a learning environment that make them not as much of a problem.

"On September 21 and 22, 2023, the American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS), in collaboration with the National Academies of Science, Engineering and Medicine (NASEM), will host "Scientific Evidence and the Courts" at AAAS headquarters in Washington, DC. This event will examine critical issues regarding the admission and use of scientific and technical findings in the United States justice system. The conference will mark the 100th anniversary of Frye v. United States (1923) and the 30th anniversary of Daubert v. Merrell Dow Pharmaceuticals. Inc. (1993), two key federal court decisions on establishing a judge's role as gatekeeper when determining the admissibility of scientific evidence and expert witness testimony at trial. Yet, application of the Frye or Daubert standard remains inconsistent across both federal and state courts, potentially allowing for unreliable evidence and testimony to enter trials, increasing the likelihood of unjust outcomes, such as wrongful convictions, and other violations of constitutional rights. This event will be in-person with a livestream option for virtual attendees."
